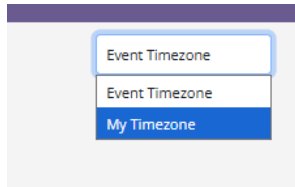


ISOPP 2026 Digital Symposium Guide

Welcome to the ISOPP 2026 Digital Symposium — a 24-hour global event featuring **30 sessions of 30 minutes**, live networking roundtables, best abstract presentations, and ISOPP updates from across the world. This page explains everything you need to know before the day so you can participate smoothly and make the most of your experience.

Know Your Time Zone - Check the programme online before the day – setting can be made for your own time zone in options when you log in. To change the times to your local time zone click on 'My Timezone' to convert the times.

How to Access Sessions on the Day - All sessions are delivered live via Zoom within the event platform.

On the Day:

1. Log in to the ISOPP 2026 platform.
2. Navigate to the auditorium. Click the screen.
3. Click “**Join**” at the scheduled time.
4. You will be taken directly into the live Zoom session.

Roundtables & Networking - Throughout the programme there are 20-minute live networking roundtables, each followed by a short break. Some of these sessions focus on specific topics (including engaging pharmacy topics as well as fun non-pharmacy topics), while others are for pure networking and conversation about anything you'd like to discuss! Participants are welcome to move freely between tables and join different discussions. No pre-booking is required — simply join any table with available space and take part!

More tables will be added pending attending numbers

Posters – There will be a Q&A facility next to the poster for any questions. The author will reply when they can during the 24hours. This facility will be closed on 22nd March to allow responses throughout the whole 24 hours of the symposium.

Session Recordings - All main sessions will be recorded. Details on how to access recordings will be shared after the symposium. They will be available to view for delegates for one month after the symposium on the platform. After six months they will then be available on the ISOPP website for all members.
