
Message from the President


Dear Colleagues,

This short contribution is an opportunity for me to update you on the recent meeting of ISOPP Secretariat and Committee Chairs in Lisbon on 19 and 20 March. A detailed report on this meeting will appear on the ISOPP website once Secretariat members have formally approved the minutes. However, I can share with you some of the key points to come out of the meeting:

- Approval of a "salary-banding" scheme to link membership fees to members income. This will be put to members for their vote.
- Formation of a working group to review the Constitution and Rules of ISOPP.
- Significant progress with the ISOPP X Symposium to be held in Malaysia
- Update of the Election Process for the ISOPP Secretariat.
- Agreement on an outline budget for 2005/06.
- Decisions to increase financial accountability and transparency.
- Excellent progress on the ISOPP International Standards document.
- New and exciting developments from other ISOPP Committees including the launch of "mini-sabbaticals" (funded by ISOPP to allow members to experience practice in other countries), a new round of research grants and new ISOPP awards.

As I say, more detailed information will follow soon on these and other key outcomes of the meeting.

A Day in the Life of a Pharmacy Educator

An article in the December 2004 newsletter, "Oncology Pharmacists Spread the Word in Canada," highlighted the challenges of Canadian health care: an enormous land mass, a sparse population, and a strong belief in universal health care for all. How do we ensure that all Canadians receive the same quality of care, regardless of where they live? In oncology, "regional" cancer centres, located in cities and affiliated with teaching hospitals, act as resources for the smaller communities

The province of British Columbia has four such centres, each supporting the many smaller centres of the Community Oncology Network (CON). There is one centre for Vancouver Island, one for the Fraser Valley, and one for the Southern Interior. The Vancouver centre looks after the rest of the province!

At each centre, a Pharmacy CON Educator provides staff development and practice support to pharmacies in their area. The educator for the Vancouver centre, ISOPP member Marianne Moore, provides a liaison for a number of hospital pharmacies. This dynamic lady is admired by pharmacists from the Sunshine Coast to the Yukon Territory. Let's see how she does it...

9-10:30 Planning the next BC Cancer Agency conference.

This annual event attracts health care professionals from across the province. Marianne works with CON Educators at the other three centres to plan "Pharmacy Day."

Learning, networking, and social opportunities will be enjoyed by pharmacists from many different practice settings. The conference isn't until November, but there seem to be a lot of action items piling up! At least one pharmacist from each CON centre is invited free-of-charge, so Marianne is compiling guest lists, and ensuring that flights and accommodations are covered.

10:30-10:45 Purdy's break!

Purdy's chocolates are, without question, one of the best things about life in BC. This box arrived by courier from the pharmacy manager in Dawson Creek, some 1200 kilometers away. Marianne arranged for a pharmacy technician from Dawson Creek to spend some time with Rowena Lee, senior technician at the Vancouver Centre, learning about chemotherapy preparation and safe handling.

10:45-11 Poster travel arrangements. The old adage "publish or perish" certainly applies to Pharmacy CON Educators. Posters

or abstracts are expected every year, at every cancer care event. The spring meeting of the National Cancer Institute of Canada (NCIC) is happening soon, and the CON Educators have had a poster accepted. The poster is based on the group's first major undertaking: the publication of "Pharmacy Guide to BCCA Chemotherapy Protocols."

This guide is the result of a structured, goal-oriented approach to program development. In 2002, a learning needs survey was sent to all BC pharmacists, the need for such a guide was identified and researched, and the final product was delivered. The success of this approach is explained in the poster "A Learning Module: A Real-Life Case Study." Unfortunately, no one in the group is able to attend the NCIC meeting. Marianne chats with Rongrong Karim, the clinical trials pharmacist at the Vancouver centre, who agrees to take the poster to Montreal.

11-12 Educating the whole team.

Canadian physicians face the same challenges as Canadian pharmacists. Physicians want to provide effective and up-to-date cancer care for their patients, regardless of where they live. Dr. Judith Pike arranges for a group of family physicians to spend six weeks in Vancouver, shadowing oncologists and speaking to other health professionals. The program typically includes an hour with a pharmacist (Marianne, of course!), but some physicians are asking for more. In isolated areas, physicians may prescribe, prepare, and administer chemotherapy; these doctors are far more interested in safe handling of chemotherapy than a typical oncologist in Vancouver. Marianne talks to Dr. Pike about spending more time with these physicians.

Teleconference

2-3 Come together. The CON Educators may be separated by the Strait of Georgia, the Fraser River, and the Rocky Mountains, but technology helps them work together. Not content to rest on their laurels, the group is starting work on another educational module. As this one is still in its infancy, the group spends today brainstorming content and formatting ideas.

3-3:30 The CON Educators rotate secretarial duties, and Marianne is this year's secretary. After the meeting, she takes a few minutes to organize the minutes.

3:30-4:30 OSCAR watch. Remember that Canadian belief in universal health care for all? It means many, many drugs have to be paid for. OSCAR is a new on-line system that allows CON hospital pharmacies to claim reimbursement for chemotherapy drugs. Marianne has a customer service role here, phoning hospitals in her area to get comments on the program and help solve problems. She has 16 calls to make this week.

4:30 And speaking of phone calls... Marianne takes a moment to register surprise that no one has phoned with questions today. Generally, she is called upon to provide a wide range of information to pharmacists throughout the province. One day she may be asked to help interpret a chemotherapy protocol. The next day she may give advice on purchasing a biological safety cabinet.

4:30-5 On the road again. An important part of Marianne's job is site visits. Visiting pharmacies allows her to meet CON pharmacists face-to-face, and identify

their learning needs. She may discuss safe handling, the protocols guide, OSCAR, or navigation of the BC Cancer Agency website. suggestions often make chemotherapy preparation easier or safer. Marianne visits each of her CON hospitals at least once a year. Tomorrow, she's making her first visit to Squamish, so she spends some time preparing and gathering materials. This small town is just an hour's drive north on the Sea to Sky highway. This is quite close by Marianne's standards – only about halfway to Whistler. Sorry, Marianne - no time for skiing!


PERMEATION OF **GLOVES**

There was an interesting discussion during the GERPAC meeting in France after the presentation of ISOPP member, Tom Connors (USA) on Permeation of gloves.

The permeation through gloves from products depends on

- a) the glove characteristics (material, thickness,)
- b) the product characteristics (molecular weight, liposolubility, ...)
- c) duration of exposure
- d) room conditions (temperature, humidity....)
- e) skin condition(wounds, sweating, ...)

Even more interesting new points that pop up in the discussion:



1/ there is a difference in between a static and a dynamic test situation. Dynamic situation is used to mimic movements of hands

Results \Longrightarrow X 2 of permeation rate 2/ there is a clear temperature influence Temperature of the gloves after 5 minutes $= 34 \, ^{\circ} \, \mathrm{C}$

Results ==> X 2 of permeation rate

Conclusion:

1/ Based on existing data, there is an underestimation of potential risk

2/ The results of a study are **ONLY** and **SOLELY** valid for the glove tested under the specified conditions. Any extrapolation to other materials, brands or test conditions would be erroneous.

All studies published until now have been performed in a static test situation. A new study at the "Université Catholique de Louvain - Belgium" by Prof.P. Wallmacq and all is finished using dynamic test situation. The results are submitted for publication.

Canadian National Oncology Pharmacy Symposium Report

Once again, the annual National Oncology Pharmacy Symposium was a tremendous success. Hosted by the Canadian Association of Pharmacy in Oncology (CAPhO), NOPS attracted over 200 oncology pharmacy practitioners nationwide. Held in Toronto October 23-24, amid the brilliant colours of an Ontario autumn, participants gathered for a weekend of learning, networking, and of course, some serious shopping in Yorkville!

Satellite events proved to be popular, with topics ranging from supportive care issues to updates on breast, lung, and haematological cancers.

ISOPP Past President Larry Broadfield opened the conference with a thoughtprovoking look at the future of oncology pharmacy practice. Saturday's program encompassed a wide range of topics: neuropathic pain, new drugs, medication errors, anticoagulation, and pharmacy based research, to name a few. Dr. Mark Clemons stole the show with a humourous, yet insightful, review of adjuvant systemic therapy for breast cancer. Sunday's program examined issues around oncology pharmacy education, looking at various training, education, and credentialing programs. ISOPP VIII co-chair Kim Stefaniuk was pleased to present CAPhO's vision for developing a national oncology pharmacy education and specialty practice initiative.

Of special note, at CAPhO's annual general meeting, members voted to approve the first-ever Standards of Practice for Oncology Pharmacy in Canada. The standards committee, chaired by ISOPP member Betty Riddell, was recognized for their significant achievement; Betty was presented with CAPhO's Distinguished Service Award for this tremendous contribution to oncology pharmacy practice.

Planning is well underway for NOPS 2005, to be held in beautiful Vancouver, British Columbia, October 29-30. Stay tuned for more details!
